This year we have teamed up with West Virginia University Fire Service Extension to offer Pro Board Certification for many of our courses.

Also, new this year we are hosting a Blended Learning version of Firefighter I where you will begin the course at your own home. You would simply need to report to the Sissonville Fire & Rescue School campus on the first Friday evening to begin the practical scenarios and take your written examination. Directions

From Park ersburg: Take I-77 South to Tupper's Creek Exit 111. Make a right at the bottom of ramp onto Call Rd. Go approximately 1.5 miles to stop sign and make a Right turn on Sissonville Dr. (CR-21). Go approximately 1.5 miles to the stop light in front of Sissonville High School and make a left onto Martins Branch Rd. Go 50 yards and make the left hand turn to enter the Sissonville High School parking lot.

From M organtown: Take I-79 South to I-77/I-79 split. Take I-77 North to Tupper's Creek Exit 111. Make a left at the bottom of ramp onto Call Rd. Go approximately 1.5 miles to stop sign and make a Right turn on Sissonville Dr. (CR-21). Go approximately 1.5 miles to the stop light in front of Sissonville High School and make a left onto Martins Branch Rd. Go 50 yards and make the left hand turn to enter the Sissonville High School parking Iot.

From Beckley: Take I-77 North through Charlest on to Tupper's Creek Exit 111. Make a left at the bottom of ramp onto Call Rd. Go approximately 1.5 miles to stop sign and make a Right turn on Sissonville Dr. (CR-21). Go approximately 1.5 miles to the stop light in front of Sissonville High School and make a left onto Martins Branch Rd. 



This course is designed to teach fire fighters and emergency responders the basic skills necessary to perform search and rescue operations using ATVs. First day students will learn basic search tactics and resources, land navigation skills, patient packaging and basic tracking.
